The New York Times Was Right the First Time: "The Right Minimum Wage: \$0.00"

The White House is pushing hard for a \$15 federal minimum wage—more than double the current rate.

Sounds great, right?

There's only one problem: a new minimum-wage law would harm the very people it is meant to help.

Like Trying to Deny the Law of Gravity . . .

Writing in *Public Discourse*, economist Victor Claar points out that good intentions aren't enough. We need to look at the actual *effects* of the minimum wage.

How about this effect? A \$15 minimum wage would eliminate 1.4 million jobs, according to the Congressional Budget Office.

Even famously liberal outlets used to acknowledge those effects. But now they've done a 180. Why?

Hint: it's not because we've managed to repeal the laws of supply and demand.
